Changing lives with paediatric prosthetics

15 children selected as recipients of legs

After Sindisiwe Tyokolo's five-year-old niece was hit by a car in Sterkspruit in March, and later had to have her foot amputated, she was unable to do many of the things other children enjoy doing.

That included going back to school and playing with friends.

But there could be light at the end of the tunnel for her thanks to an initiative between Walter Sisulu University (WSU) and the Eastern Cape department of health to produce paediatric prosthetics for scores of needy children.

The project will see WSU's department of rehabilitation, housed within the faculty of health sciences and medicine, collaborate with the health department to provide artificial limbs for children.

WSU spokesperson Yonela Tukwayo said the prosthetics would be manufactured in Mthatha.

"This project will help improve their mobility as well as their general quality of life," she said.

The initiative forms part of SA's 30 years of democracy celebrations and the university's rehabilitation department's ongoing community services efforts aimed at pro-

viding essential support to local communities.

Tukwayo said 15 children had been selected as recipients of prosthetic legs.

She said rehabilitation department staff had recently visited Mthatha, Gqeberha and East London to do casting and pre-prosthetic fitting for the recipients.

An elated Tyokolo, who is her niece's guardian, said receiving a prosthesis would enable the child to return to school.

She said the accident had drastically changed her niece's life.

"This will really help the child because she will now be able to go back to school.

"She will return to the child she used to be and have the freedom to play with other children and take part in the activities she used to love."

Sesethu Sibika, 32, from Khowa (formerly Elliot), whose three-year-old son had to have his right leg amputated after birth due to a medical condition, was overjoyed at the

prospect of seeing her son being able to walk on his own.

"I had to choose whether my child would have to undergo constant operations until he turned 18 or let doctors amputate immediately.

"I could not let him grow up like that, so I chose amputation.

"I am now happy that he will receive a leg and be able to walk and be like other children."

WSU rehabilitation department lecturer Siphosethu Mg-wili said the project formed part of the university's service to the community, benefitting those in need.

"I think it is such a norm that if a child was born a certain way, for instance, with a foot that was too small, then the parent decides on amputation and the child will grow up that way. Parents do not consider that there are alternatives to this, such as getting a prosthetic leg," she said.

She said WSU wanted to create awareness of the assistance available to patients in the Eastern Cape as many parents did not realise their children could get prosthetic limbs.

Mgwili, who has received many accolades for her work

in prosthetics, said WSU's rehabilitation department would continue to initiate projects for the benefit of communities, and its students.

Health MEC Ntandokazi Capa's spokesperson, Mkhululi Ndamase, said the department was always looking to form partnerships that would "assist us in delivering quality healthcare services to the people of the Eastern Cape".

He said WSU was one of the department's strategic partners and it would continue to work with the university and other institutions of higher learning.
